Building Blocks – Creating Worlds Through Play 22 February–26 October 2025

Nothing more than small blocks ... yet they can effortlessly create entire fantastic worlds. Building is an ancient human practice that spans cultures, generations and social divides. So, it's no wonder that building blocks are one of the oldest toys in the world. Around the globe, children continue to stack blocks, reconstructing familiar worlds or inventing entirely new ones. It is a universal activity that brings people together and makes the world "graspable" in every sense of the word.

The 19th century marked the first time children began building with blocks according to a set of instructions – thanks in part to German pedagogue Friedrich Fröbel, the "father" of the kindergarten. Historical building sets reflect the trends, educational ideas and values of their time, as well as the challenges they faced. During peacetime, for example, the illustrations on the lids of the sets depicted everyday scenes such as railways, bridges and carriages. Wartime brought changes in both imagery and materials: scrap metal replaced wood, for example.

The late 1940s saw the introduction of plastic building blocks, offering new possibilities. Unlike wooden and stone bricks, which relied on friction or gravity, the slight flexibility of plastic allowed the blocks to fit together precisely and securely. This made it possible to create much more complex and durable structures.

Building blocks can be used over and over again and combined in almost endless ways. Playing with them helps children develop their cognitive and motor abilities. The precise assembly of blocks boosts visual and spatial thinking as well as fine motor skills. Overcoming challenges and working on complex projects teaches patience, perseverance and problem solving. As a result, building blocks not only stimulate the imagination but also build confidence in one's own creative abilities.

Play stations in the exhibition encourage visitors to build, tear down, transform and reinvent – allowing them to forget the world around them just long enough to create their own.

A doll plays in the toy grocery shop, teddy bears race one another in pedal cars, an entire amusement park is set into motion at the push of a button ... With more than 6,000 objects, the Spielzeug Welten Museum Basel (Toy Worlds Museum Basel) is unique across the world in its abundance and quality. Accommodated in a building from 1867, it lies in the very heart of Basel. Its cheery, lovingly arranged display windows have meanwhile become famous far and wide: they attract visitors of all ages and are an invitation to discover a world full of wonders. Several times a year, special temporary exhibitions on a wide variety of topics beckon visitors on a foray into new cultural realms, shining a spotlight on the unknown and placing the exhibits in a – sometimes surprising – historical context.
